Assessor best practice

Hand out the study guide prior to assessment to help the candidate prepare Check any prerequisite requirements* before completing the assessment Verify the candidate's abilities with the contractor or foreman prior to the assessment Always use the most recent assessment and study guide documents order new documents as required Keep the assessment schedule on hand as an aid Keep the training separate from the assessment Rephrase questions as required Use formative assessment where possible Only assess to the level of the unit – check the level descriptors if unsure (become familiar with NZQA level descriptions)

Do not assess units out of scope – there will be no retrospective upgrades.

Read the full title of the unit, unit number, unit version and unit level.

- 3 Discuss the appeal process with the candidates (NZQA requirement)
- 4 Check for literacy issues
 Offer assistance to the candidate if required (oral assessment option).
- 5 Carry out a hazard ID with candidate

 As appropriate for the unit being assessed (ie practical unit).
- 6 Collect evidence for every question or assessment task

This could be:

- » Written by the candidate in a supervised situation
- » Written by assessor during an oral assessment
- » Confirmed by the assessor where the candidate has filled out the assessment in an unsupervised situation. The assessor must confirm all questions have been answered by the candidate and that they can demonstrate understanding, through answering oral questions asked by the assessor.
- 7 Inform candidate of results

If 'Not Yet Competent', explain why and what additional work or training is required. Where possible set a date for reassessment.

- Retain for a minimum of 12 months. However two years is recommended for moderation purposes.
- Notify the national moderator
 Prior to assessing another assessor for a unit standard. Failure to do so may result in future upgrading being denied.
